
"QUERENCIA" PANEL DISCUSSION - JUNE 28

Valerie Martínez, Director of History and Literary Arts, moderates a panel with the editors of the anthology--Levi Romero, Vanessa Fonseca-Chávez, and Spencer R. Herrera.

The anthology is dedicated to New Mexico cultural envoy Juan Estevan Arellano who writes that querencia "is that which gives us a sense of place, that which anchors us to the land, that which makes us a unique people, for it implies a deeply rooted knowledge of place, and for that reason we respect it as our home."



This collection of both deeply personal reflections and scholarly essays explores the New Mexico homeland through the experiences and perspectives of Indigenous, Nuevomexicano/a, Chicanx, Genízaro and other writers and scholars from across the state.


Tips for your photos:

- Pose on your porch or front yard, or "parade" safely (with mask and social distancing) on your street. Be sure to follow state health guidelines.
- Wear white (the color worn by women in U.S. suffrage parades in 1918-1920).
- Create signs and wear sashes that celebrate women's suffrage and/or encourage voting.
- Individual and group photos are acceptable.
- Submit no more than two photos.
- Submit hi-resolution photos in jpeg or png format.
- We cannot accept photos with visible logos or branded text, cartoon or video characters, or inappropriate sayings/text.
